

# HARLESTON, WITH REDDENHALL & NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**HARLESTON** is a respectable market town in the parish of Reddenhall and hundred of Earsham—100 miles N. E. from London, 20 s. from Norwich, and 30 N. E. from Bury St. Edmunds—situated on the high road from the latter town to Yarmouth, and about a mile from the river Waveney. It was anciently called *Herolvestone* or *Heroldstone*, a name derived from that of a Danish chief, who is said to have encamped here. The town, which is remarkable for its cleanly aspect, consists principally of two streets, running parallel to each other. The scenery, as viewed from several situations in the parish, is highly picturesque; and the land, which is a mixture of arable and pasture, is exceedingly productive. The manufacture of bombasines is carried on to a limited extent; but the trade of the place is chiefly of a local character, depending for support on the resident population, together with the attendance of farmers and others at the market. The Duke of Norfolk is lord of the manor, and holds courts occasionally.

The parish church, dedicated to the Virgin Mary,

**HARLING (EAST AND WEST), AND KENNINGHALL.**

**EAST HARLING**, or **MARKET HARLING**, is a small market town and parish, in the hundred of Guiltcross, 90 miles N. E. by N. from London, 22 s. w. from Norwich, and nine N. E. from Thetford. It is a neat little town, seated on the banks of a rivulet, which adds its waters to the river Waveney, and was once famous for the manufacture and sale of yarn and linen cloth; at present it is destitute of trade, except that derived from the produce of the land, which is fertile. The church, dedicated to St. Peter and St. Paul, has a square embattled tower, surmounted by a spire. The interior of the church is ornamented with a richly carved screen, and the chancel windows with ancient stained glass; there is likewise a beautiful altar tomb, with recumbent figures in marble, of Sir Robert Harling and his lady. The benefice is a rectory, of which the Rev. T. B. Wilkinson is the incumbent. There are places of worship for the society of friends and Wesleyan methodists. The market, which is one principally for corn, is held on Tuesday: the fairs are 4th May and 24th October for cattle, and the first Tuesday after the 12th September for sheep; the latter is a large one. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,031 inhabitants.

Two miles from East Harling is the small village and parish of **WEST HARLING**, containing a church, dedicated to All Saints, and a population, at the census taken in 1831, of 107 persons.

**KENNINGHALL**, once a market town, is in the same hundred as East Harling, three miles from that town. It was formerly a place of some note, having a royal palace; and was the ancient seat of the Howard family, and continued so till the middle of the 16th century. Some immunities are still preserved to the inhabitants, they being exempt from tolls, stallage, and serving on any jury out of the lordship. The office of chief butler at the coronation is claimed in right of this manor, of which the Duke of Norfolk is the lord. The church, dedicated to St. Mary, is a handsome building; the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the see of Ely; the Rev. William Killett is the present vicar. The market, entitled to be held on Monday, has not been attended for some years, but there are cattle fairs on the 18th July and 30th September. Kenninghall parish contained, by the returns for 1831, 1,251 inhabitants. The increase of population in this parish has only amounted to one hundred in thirty years.
